COUNCIL MEMBER LEROY COMRIE AND THE BLACK LATINO & ASIAN CAUCUS (BLAC) TO RECOGNIZE 10,000th PERSON TO OBTAIN EMPLOYMENT THROUGH THE JOBS TO BUILD ON PROGRAM

On June 13, 2012, in front of the steps of City Hall, Council Member Leroy Comrie and members of the BLAC will honor Tyrone Freeman, the 10,000th person to successfully obtain a job through the Jobs to Build On Program (JtBO) administered by the Consortium for Worker Education (CWE).

Mr. Freeman works for K & G Stores as an Assistant Manager where his annual salary is \$50,000.00 (\$25.24 per hour). He was looking for work for a year, and after participating in the East River Development Alliance (ERDA) program, he received his new job on May 21, 2012.

Over the past five years, the New York City Council and the BLAC, have played a crucial role in improving the education and employment opportunities of thousands of New Yorkers, through the creation and funding of (JtBO). The City Council's partnership with CWE has changed the nature of worker services in New York City. Through a network of unions and community based organizations, CWE has successfully trained tens of thousands of low-income residents in the most burdened of our city's neighborhoods and employed thousands of them.

This cost-free program offers courses throughout the city to people who need training in English as a second language, to obtain a General Education Diploma (GED), computer literacy, and improvement in interviewing and networking skills.

"With New York City having one of the largest unemployment rates in the country, I am proud to have had a hand in creating the Jobs To Build On program" said **Council Member Leroy Comrie.** "As we celebrate the ten-thousandth person to have earned a job, we need to continue our efforts to help New Yorkers who are still unemployed obtain the skills and education

necessary to obtain one. This is a program we need to continue to fund and expand and I look forward to working with Speaker Quinn and the BLAC in continuing these efforts."

Council Member Fernando Cabrera: "As Co-Chair of the NYC Council Black, Latino and Asian Caucus, I am proud to recognize this special achievement and to support the Jobs to Build on Program administered by the Consortium for Worker Education. Tyrone Freeman: "I was laid off April 15 2011 then went to ERDA April 18 of 2011 and thirteen months to the day I entered the program, I received a job. Going through the program and participating in mock interviews, resume building, and access to computer labs, all helped with the process. The best thing about it was that everything was free. They even gave me a metro card to go to my interview. The staff was very professional and it gave me a sense of comfort to know I had resources in the community to rely on."

JtBO is a partnership between labor unions, community groups, and workforce providers that is funded by the City Council.
